Mozart's Piano Sonata No. 14 in C Minor, K. 457 follows this standard practice as the first movement is in single movement form, the second movement is a drawn out ABA, and the last movement resembles a rondo. Completed on October 14, 1784, this piece was composed during Mozart's Vienna years.

The Piano Sonata No. 14 in C minor, K. 457, by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was composed and completed in 1784, with the official date of completion recorded as 14 October 1784 in Mozart's own catalogue of works. It was published in December 1785 together with the Fantasy in C minor, K. 475, as Opus 11 by the publishing firm Artaria, Mozart's main Viennese publisher. The title page bore a dedication to Therese von Trattner, who was one of Mozart's pupils in Vienna. Her husband, Thomas von Trattner, w

Mozart: Piano Sonata No.14 in C minor, K.457 Analysis Made popular in the Classical era by composers such as Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, the sonata became a standard and popular form that is still significant in compositional realms today. Mozart's Piano Sonata No. 14 in C Minor, K. 457 significantly represents the textbook definition of sonata

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The Piano Sonata No. 14 in C minor is only one of two sonatas Mozart wrote in the minor key, the other being the great Piano

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Sonata No. 8 in A minor, K. 310, which was written six years earlier, around the time of the death of Mozart's mother. Mozart was extremely deliberate in choosing tonalities for his compositions; therefore, his choice of C minor for this sonata implies that this piece was perhaps a very personal work.

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Composed in Vienna in the fall of 1784, the C minor sonata was entered in the thematic catalog Mozart started earlier that year on October 14. For Mozart, 1784 was a year of intense

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compositional activity for the piano, the eight preceding entries in the catalog all indicating piano works. Six months later, Mozart composed a Fantasia in C Minor, K. 475, that has become irrevocably associated with the sonata and invariably precedes it in performance, forming an expansive prelude.

Mozart's Piano Sonata in Bb K.570 was written in Vienna in the

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February of 1789 and first published posthumously in 1796. A violin part was included, however it was “so lacking in invention that it can be considered spurious with near certainty” (Robins, 2014).

Analysis: Mozart Piano Sonata in B-Flat Major K. 570 No. 1 ...

It starts in D minor and, modulating freely, touches the keys of G minor, B flat major (dominant seventh only), C minor, E flat major (dominant seventh only), F major (dominant seventh only), and G minor, ending on the dominant seventh in B flat major, to lead into the recapitulation in that key.
