Intensive care unit (ICU) telemedicine uses audio-visual technology to provide critical care services from a remote location (1, 2). In its most common form, ICU telemedicine consists of remote monitoring of ICU patients using fixed installations, either continuously or during nighttime hours (3).

A tele-intensive care unit (tele-ICU) uses telemedicine in an intensive care unit (ICU) setting, applying technology to provide care to critically ill patients by off-site clinical resources. The purpose of this review was to examine the implementation, adoption, and utilization of tele-ICU systems by hospitals to determine their efficiency and efficacy as identified by cost savings and patient outcomes.

The American Heart Association (AHA) guidelines, which are based on expert opinion, recommend telemetry monitoring for active cardiac conditions. 1 The Choosing Wisely campaign has adopted these guidelines to optimize telemetry use outside the intensive care unit (ICU), because inappropriate use can affect patient care adversely and increases costs.
